

THE OPIOID CRISIS

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NATIONAL STATISTICS

- More than 64,000 Americans died from drug overdoses in 2016.
 - · 175 people everyday
 - More deaths than caused by gun violence and vehicular accidents combined
 - · Leading cause of death in individuals under 50 YOA
- · About 2/3 of drug overdose deaths involve opioids
 - 40,000 (2016 data)
 - 110 people everyday
 - One overdose every 12.5 minutes



- From 2002 to 2015 there has been a 2.8 fold increase in the number of deaths involving opioids
- Why did this happen?
 - Not a single reason
 - Shift in policies dealing with pain
 - Personal story
 - Drug CompaniesPrescribers

 - Patients
- Take all of us working together to have an impact on this crisis



FENTANYL

- Half of the opioid deaths in 2016 (20,000) were related to fentanyl and fentanyl analogues
 - Up to 100 times stronger than morphine and many times that of heroin
 - Risk for anyone who has contact
 - Touch
 - Airborne
 - · Law Enforcement Safety
 - "PINK"

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ARKANSAS

- 401 Overdose deaths in 2016
 - New England states, Ohio, West Virginia particularly hard hit
 - · Underestimated?
- Worry:
 - 2^{nd} highest prescribing rate of pain meds in the U.S.
 - 114.7/100 people
 - Highest rate in the U.S. for kids 12-17 years of age who have used pain meds for non-medical purposes

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Arkansas Accomplishments

- Standing Order for Naloxone
- All Prescribers Required to Use the PDMP
 - Allow law enforcement access to PDMP
- Good Samaritan Act
- Rx Take Back Program
- Arkansas Naloxone Project

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Arkansas Naloxone Project

- · First Responders
 - Targeted Approach
 - · Policy with CPR
 - Medical Director MOU
 - Narcan Administration Training with Kits
 - · Emphasize the Dangers of Fentanyl
 - Provide Information about Local Treatment
- Families in Recovery
 - Very Vulnerable Time
 - Different Training than Law Enforcement
 - Support Structure

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Arkansas Naloxone Project

- · Need Naloxone in Schools
 - Massachusetts
 - Pennsylvania also very progressive
 - · LR Central High Incident
 - Working with Arkansas Nurses
- 68 Naloxone saves in Arkansas
- · Community Prevention
 - Don't Run, Call 911
 - · How to Talk to Your Doctor

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Arkansas Drug Endangered Children Project

- Kids who are born addicted or live in families where illicit drug activities occur
 - More kids die from neglect then from physical abuse
- Law enforcement and social services fundamentally need to change the way they work together
 - Breaking down the silos
- Many of these kids grow up to be child and drug abusers
- We need to break this cycle!!

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
